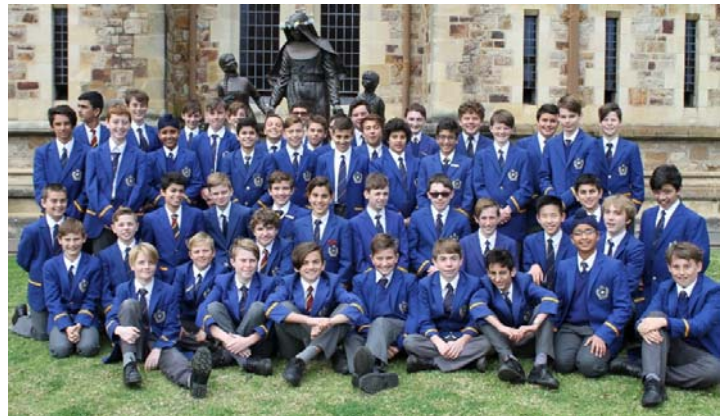


**THE FEAST OF ST MARY OF THE CROSS (MACKILLOP)**

On Tuesday 8 August it was the Feast of St Mary of the Cross (Mackillop), Australia's first Saint. As many of you are aware, one of our main parent meeting places at the College, the Mackillop Centre, is named in her honour.

Mary MacKillop was born in 1842 in (Fitzroy) Melbourne and on 8 August 1909 she died, having suffered a disabling stroke in 1902. Inspired by a meeting with Fr Julian Tenison-Woods, Mary MacKillop at the age of 25 took her vows and the religious name, "Mary of the Cross". In doing so, she founded the congregation of the Sisters of Saint Joseph. Soon after taking her religious vows, Mary MacKillop began schools. Within 5 years of taking her vows and founding the Congregation of the Sisters of Saint Joseph, Mary had established over 30 schools in South Australia and over 100 women had joined the Sisters of Saint Joseph.

Mary MacKillop was very conscious of the plight of the poor and needy. She worked with families that lived in isolated areas of Australia. As a result, Mary MacKillop pioneered a new form of religious life in Australia and commenced a "system" of "Josephite" schools that would provide education, especially for the children of the poor. In 1873, Pope Pius IX gave Papal approval for the Congregation of the Sisters of Saint Joseph. Even today, many Australians can say that they too have felt the impact of the enormous work started by St Mary of the Cross (MacKillop) having been educated or cared for by the Sisters of Saint Joseph. She was noted for her trust in the providence of God and miracles of healing have been attributed to her. Pope Benedict XVI declared her a Saint on 17 October 2010.

In Semester 2, students in Year 10 will be completing the Personal Learning Plan (PLP) as the first stage of their SACE Certificate. This is designed to assist students to identify possible career paths. Various parent information nights are scheduled to explain the subject selection process and SACE Certificate requirements and I urge parents to attend these if at all possible.

Mr Anthony Vizaniaris and Ms Rose Coorey are available for careers counselling and Mr Kevin Woolford is available for advice on VET courses.

Due dates for the return of various paperwork will be published on the forms. ## AURECON BRIDGE BUILDING COMPETITION 2017

Interested students were asked to apply to be a part of an exciting competition; the Aurecon Bridge Building Competition which was judged at the Adelaide Convention Centre on North Terrace last week. The aim of this competition was to provide students with an insight into the design and construction of engineering structures. The Aurecon Bridge Building Competition is a national event that helps students bring their ideas to life by encouraging them to develop their understanding of Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) by building a bridge using balsa wood, string, glue and cardboard.

The competition not only provides students with a bridge engineering challenge to solve, but also provides feedback from expert judges. The battle for prizes was played out in front of all participating schools, with the spectacle of seeing their bridges load-tested to destruction.

There were approximately 50 teams having their bridges judged on the day; a total of 150 students. Two teams were selected in a Gifted and Talented initiative to represent St Michael's College:

**Team Blue: Isaac Brown 8ST, Kobe Burt 8ST, Lachlan Davis 8ST**

**Team Maroon: Patrick Rawlings 8BE, Giovanni Saraceno 8BE, Zane Newlands 8BE**

Prior to the event, the students made a commitment to spend many of their lunchtimes in Term 2 to work as part of a team to research, design and construct a bridge using supplied materials following a design brief.

The students' brief was to design and construct a bridge using only balsa wood, a cardboard tube, PVA glue and one piece of 5 metre long string. This bridge building project involved research, planning, teamwork, decision making, problem solving, creative thinking and innovation with the result being an efficient design. All the bridges were evaluated according to the maximum load supported, the aesthetics, the workmanship and creativity of the design.

Team Blue's bridge was able to withstand 7.4 kg, while the bridge built by Team Maroon held an impressive 10.6 kg. All of the students were thrilled with the winning result and had a fun time. This is evident in the reflection of the event, below:

## YEAR 8 PASTORAL PROGRAM - 'CLASSACT 50 TASK CHALLENGE'

It is always a good idea to review digital citizenship skills with students and to encourage a culture of respect and positive interaction in their online and offline worlds. This term in Year 8 Pastoral Care we will be having a large focus on Digital Citizenship and Cyber Safety. Students will be undertaking the 'ClassAct 50 Task Challenge' which has been designed to support individuals, classes and communities to consider and act on the issues the digital world can present.

The challenge provides a mix of quick, daily tasks designed to help students take control of their online safety, promote thinking around respectful relationships and to know where to go to find support if things go wrong. As a class, students may decide to commit to completing one task, every day for a whole term, or decide to do one a week in small groups. Regardless of the approach, the important part is making digital intelligence a regular part of our conversations. This will aim to help increase digital safety, reduce negative behaviours like cyberbullying and make time spent online more positive. The tasks encourage self-reflection and group discussion and class action. As always, we encourage parents to have ongoing conversations with their children about their interactions online. ### YEAR 12 PARENTS & STUDENTS

We appreciated the turnout of in excess of 100 Year 12 parents who attended the presentation on Monday night. As promised the presentation is now available on the College website [click here to view](#). It is also accessible on the College Intranet Student Services page for students. This week we have also distributed the SATAC and University materials to all Year 12 students and reminded them to download the 2018, 2019, 2020, SATAC tertiary entrance booklet from the [SATAC website](#) (as hard copies are no longer available it can be saved as an IBook). The presentation as to how to apply via SATAC etc. will be delivered to students in the MacKillop Centre on Thursday 17 August from 9.15 - 10.15am. After this, students who require assistance are welcome to make an appointment. Of course, we continue to welcome Year 12 students to make an appointment discuss other aspects such as ATARS, study skills and study pathways.

A final reminder for any student interested in sitting the Flinders UniTest as outlined in an email by Mr Vizaniaris, to register interest students must email him with a non St Michael's email address by Friday 18 August. Students will sit for the UniTest on Thursday 7 September at 8.45-11.30am.

## YEAR 10 SUBJECT SELECTION INTO YEAR 11 2018

Students now have their subject selection resource package and we encourage them to begin the process of selecting Year 11 subjects as soon as possible. They will need to access the 2018 Curriculum Guide online and also download the 2018, 2019, 2020, SATAC tertiary entrance booklet from the [SATAC Website](#) (it is no longer published as a hard copy but once downloaded it can be saved as an IBook.) Both these publications are critical in the subject selection process and we encourage families to work through them together. There is a pre appointment form for students who wish to have an appointment with a career counsellor, as part of the subject selection process. We ask students to collect one from Student Services and complete it prior to their appointment. Students who have not completed it prior to the appointment will be reallocated to a later appointment time. Parents are welcome to accompany their son or daughter to these appointments. The majority of appointment times are during the traditional school day. The blue subject selection form needs to be completed and submitted to Student services by Wednesday 23 August. At the compulsory subject counselling appointment on Monday 28 August a staff member reviews the choices that have been made and a discussion will take place as to the suitability of those choices, it is not a career counselling appointment. As such students who feel they would benefit from an appointment with a career counsellor are encouraged to visit Students Services during recess or lunch and make an appointment in the coming week. There will be a lot of work done with regards to the subject selection process within Year 10 PLP as well. Students received a pink career website sheet in their packages, which is also very valuable in terms of general career research tools.
